Programme structure

You will take two core and four optional courses, and submit a dissertation.

Core courses

- · Current issues in social theory
- · Research design.

Optional courses may include:

- · A public social science
- Class and stratification
- Gender relations
- · Improving health and social outcomes
- Introduction to social theory for researchers
- Racism and modernity
- · Religion in society
- · Sexualities and society
- · The disabling society.

You will take at least three courses from this list. One additional course may be chosen from other subjects within the School of Social and Political Sciences

Career prospects

By the end of the programme, you will have a variety of skills useful in the contemporary labour market. These include critical thinking, appreciation of the impact of institutions, including how people mediate them, and the ability to conduct research and utilise data.
