
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HUFTON READING GROUP CONFERENCE

Maud Bracke, Co-director
Inventing Reproductive Rights: Sex, Bodies and Population
1945-1995, AHRC Leadership Fellowship, 2021-2023

This research project aims to provide a historical and internationally comparative answer to the question: How and why did we come to think of human procreative choices and behaviour in terms of individual rights? Which historical actors and factors contributed to the creation of discourses and practices allowing individuals to claim that autonomy in decisions regarding procreation as an undeniable human right?

The empirical research is centred on France, Italy, the United Kingdom and Yugoslavia, but is also an exercise in 'provincialising' European historical narratives. Using an intersectional-feminist approach, it will resituate these in relation to globally travelling practices and discourses, and explore the ways in which the articulation of a 'modern' reproductive subject in Europe formed part of civilisational discourse marked by the othering of those perceived as different.

The research will feed into knowledge exchange with non-academic partners, specifically the Sandyford Sexual Health Services Clinic in Glasgow, aimed at creating building blocks towards an agenda for Education in Reproductive Rights in Scotland. Key outputs will be an educational comic aimed at young people, and a survey and focus group discussions aimed at exploring young people's views on and experiences of reproductive rights.


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Living Gender History Podcast

The Rime of the Ancient Feminist - a satiric retelling of Samuel Taylor Coleridge's 18th century poem from Scottish feminist, Stephanie Markman - was published in 1981 by 'Stramullion', a Scottish feminist press established in the late 1970s by a group of Edinburgh based women affiliated with the WLM in Scotland.
