## Welcome to the University of Glasgow

A very warm welcome to the University of Glasgow and the city of Glasgow. We feel honoured and privileged to host this year's UK-Ireland Planning Research Conference. We would like to thank all speakers and discussants for their contributions and look forward to thought-provoking debates and fruitful networking among delegates.

Urban Studies at the University of Glasgow has a rich history of engaging with planning theory, policy and practice going back over half a century: the original Department of Town and Regional Planning was founded in 1964, the same year that the journal Urban Studies was launched by Glasgow academics. In the 1980s, the Centre for Housing Research was set up, which later morphed into the current Urban Studies department. Following an initial professional qualification in housing, the department began to offer a PG Cert in Social Policy in 2000 with accreditation from the Chartered Institute of Housing (CIH); this was followed in 2005 with the launch of the MSc in Public Policy and in 2006



the MSc City Planning (RTPI) and the MSc Real Estate (RICS). More recently, the MSc Urban Transport and MSc Urban Analytics have complemented our suite of Masters programmes.

Over the last decade, Urban Studies has hosted three major research centres through which much of our planning-related research takes place. The UK Collaborative Centre for Housing Evidence (CaCHE) is a partnership between academia and housing policy and practice involving eight UK institutions with funding from both AHRC and ESRC. The Urban Big Data Centre (UBDC), funded by ESRC, is a research hub as well as a national data service that hosts a data collection and offers expertise in urban analytics. On its part, the Centre for Sustainable, Healthy and Learning Cities and Neighbourhoods (SHLC) has pursued innovative research, within the framework of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals, at the intersection between urban sustainability, health and wellbeing, and education through a global partnership of seven institutions. We are also actively involved in the AHRC's Place Programme following the appointment of Professor Rebecca Madgin as its director. Colleagues from the three centres, the Place programme as well as the wider department will be happy to discuss their work with you and explore potential collaborations.

Finally, as Glasgow is one of the wettest cities in the UK, there is a good chance that you will encounter rain during your visit. If so, you may be interested in finding out about 'Living with Rain: Planning for Everyday Life in Glasgow' from my colleague Dr Andrew Hoolachan, who recently launched this obviously relevant project with funding support from RTPI.



## **Public Transportation**

For those unfamiliar with Glasgow's West End, all of our conference venues are quickly and easily accessible from the city centre by public transport. Options include:

#### Subway

A 10-minute <u>Glasgow Subway</u> journey from Buchanan Street or St Enoch subway stations to Kelvinbridge, Hillhead and Kelvinhall stations, all of which are about a 5- walk to the university. For convenience we have noted the nearest subway station to each venue in the list of venues above.



#### Bus

A 10-minute bus journey from Hope Street via First Bus route No.4 or 4A.

#### Bike

A 10-minute cycle from the city centre. Glasgow operates a NextBike hire scheme across the city, and you can find more details here.

#### Taxi

Taxis are widely available from <u>Glasgow Taxis</u> (Hackney carriage), <u>GlasgGO Cabs</u> (private hire) and via Uber on your smart phone.

## **Quiet Space**

A quiet space for delegates that need a break from socialising and networking will be available in Room 433B on the 4<sup>th</sup> Floor of the St Andrews Building on the 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> September. ## Presentation Format and Etiquette

Please note the following information about the format and etiquette of the paper and roundtable sessions at the 2023 UK-Ireland Planning Research Conference.

### **Concurrent Paper Sessions**

- Delegates are not required to submit a paper in advance of the conference.
- Concurrent paper sessions will last for 80-minutes.
- The majority of sessions contain <u>four papers</u>, however, there are also a small number of three and five paper sessions.
- In <u>three and four paper</u> sessions delegates should prepare a presentation lasting <u>no more than 15-minutes</u>. In <u>five paper</u> sessions delegates should prepare a presentation lasting <u>no more than 10-minutes</u>.
- Delegates should bring their presentation to their session on a <u>USB stick in PowerPoint</u> or PDF format.
- Papers must be presented in the order outlined in the detailed programme of concurrent sessions.
- Every effort has been made to ensure that the papers in each session are a good match. Where this has not been possible, we apologise.
- All of the concurrent paper sessions will be moderated by a track chair based at the
  University of Glasgow. The track chairs will keep time strictly and provide a five- and
  two-minute warning to each delegate as their presentation nears completion. We ask
  that you treat our track chair volunteers with respect.



- Presenters that exceed the 15-minute/10-minute presentation time will be asked to stop. This is to ensure that each of the presenters in the session get equal time to present.
- At the end of each session there will be <u>15-minutes for questions</u>. Track chairs will
  invite questions from the audience after all of the papers have been presented and not
  after each presentation.
- Track chairs are not expected to give feedback on individual presentations.
- Delegates should <u>arrive at their session at least five minutes early</u> to meet their fellow presenters and to allow time for the various presentations to be uploaded onto the static PC in the room.

#### Roundtables

- There is one block of concurrent roundtable sessions lasting <u>60-minutes</u> on Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> September between 14:30 – 15:30.
- The format of the roundtables is at the <u>discretion of the submitting chair and</u> participants.
- The roundtables will not be moderated by a track chair.
- A static PC and projection facilities will be available in each room if required.

## Welcome Plenary Roundtable

Monday 4<sup>th</sup> September, 17:00 – 18:00 Room 745, 7<sup>th</sup> Floor, James McCune Smith Learning Hub

The conference welcome and plenary roundtable will be held in the University of Glasgow's new James McCune Smith Learning Hub, which opened in April 2021. The 'JMS', as the building has become known, is named after the first African American to be awarded a medical degree, receiving an MD from the University of Glasgow in 1837. McCune Smith was born into slavery in 1813 and was later freed by New York State's Emancipation Act on July 4, 1827. McCune Smith subsequently attended the African Free School in Manhattan and applied to several American universities. After being denied entry to all due to his race, McCune Smith applied for — and was accepted by — the University of Glasgow's medical school where he completed his training. Upon returning to New York, McCune Smith set up medical practice and grew to be recognised as a prominent figure in the black community.

Our plenary roundtable is titled "Planning on a Crisis Footing: The Current and Future Context for Planning in Glasgow and Scotland". Moderated by Dr Andrew Hoolachan, Lecturer in Planning at the University of Glasgow, the roundtable invites three leading Scottish practitioners to reflect on the pressing planning challenges facing towns and cities in Scotland and to describe how new and innovative planning practices are shaping Scotland's future.

Joining Andrew will be: **Jude Barber**, one of the founding members of leading Scottish architectural practice, Collective Architecture which is 100% employee-owned and founded on the principles of creative freedom, equity and sustainability; **Clir Holly Bruce**, who was recently elected as a Green councillor for Glasgow's Langside ward and is an advocate of a "holistic" feminist approach to planning that make urban areas safer and more attractive for women; and, **Fiona Simpson**, Scotland's Chief Planner and one of the principal authors of the Scotlish Government's new National Planning Framework 4 which, for the first time, brings together Scotland's spatial strategy and planning policy in one document that focuses on how Scotland addresses the climate crisis through the planning system.

## RTPI Awards Ceremony

The annual RTPI Awards Ceremony is a chance to celebrate research and its role in shaping planning practice. The awards recognise and promote high quality, impactful research by academics at accredited planning schools and planning consultancies in the UK, Ireland, and internationally.



The RTPI Awards Ceremony will also be held in the JMS building where delegates can enjoy 180-degree views of Glasgow and the River Clyde. Dominating the vista is the University of Glasgow's Gilbert Scot Building. It was named for its architect, Sir George Gilbert Scott, who was a leading member of the gothic revival movement in the 19<sup>th</sup> century and the celebrated architect of numerous notable buildings including the hotel at London's St. Pancras Station and the Albert Memorial.



## Welcome Drinks Reception

Delegates will be invited to process as a group up University Avenue from the James McCune Smith Learning Hub to the University of Glasgow's Hunterian Glasgow for a drink's reception. The Hunterian showcases the University's extensive art collection and includes works by Whistler, Mackintosh, Rembrant, Rubens, the Glasgow Boys and the Scottish Colourists, as well as contemporary artists. The gallery also features artwork by women and other artists who have been less well represented. Incorporated into the museum is the Macintosh House, the home of the celebrated arts and craft architect, Charles Rennie Mackintosh, which once stood close to where the gallery is now located.

## Conference Dinner

The conference drinks dinner will take place in the central hall of the Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum, located a short walk from the main conference venue through Kelvingrove Park. The Kelvingrove opened in 1901 as the Palace of Fine Arts for the Glasgow International Exhibition. It now houses the city's extensive art, architecture, natural history, and armoury collection. Delegates are invited to arrive at 19:00 for a drink's reception and recital on the Gallery's pipe organ before dinner is served. Throughout the evening, delegates will also have the opportunity to view the museum's collection.

## Spaces of Hope Exhibition

Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> September, 08:30 – 14:00 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor foyer, St. Andrews Building

Spaces of Hope is an AHRC-funded project exploring the Hidden Histories of Community-led Planning in the UK (HOPE, <a href="https://www.peoplesplans.org/">https://www.peoplesplans.org/</a>). It is led by Prof Sue Brownill (Oxford Brookes University) and — working in partnership with the TCPA — brings together researchers from Oxford Brookes University, the University of Sheffield, Queens University Belfast, Cardiff University and Middlesex University who are supported by an Advisory Group comprising professionals involved in private practice, community development, academia and the charitable sector.

The Planning Research Conference will host an exhibition of this exciting project to show case the results. These explore the often-overlooked ways in which local people and organisations have come together to improve their physical and social environments. Since the 1960s a rich but hidden history has emerged of communities drawing up their own land-use plans, owning, occupying and developing sites, initiating community projects and using art and others forms of media to communicate ideas.

Delegates can learn more about the project by attending the Spaces of Hope roundtable (see Conference Programme) and by dropping into a 'fringe' event that will be held as an alternative to the Mobile Tours between 15:30-17:30 in Room 214 in the St. Andrews Building (see Spaces of Hope Fringe Event Programme). The 'fringe' event will review the rich history of community planning across the UK, with a particular focus on community planning in Scotland.



## **Keynote Lecture**

The conference will conclude with a keynote lecture by Professor Yvonne Rydin titled "Meeting the Challenges of Planning Without Growth". Yvonne Rydin is Professor of Planning, Environment and Public Policy in the Bartlett School of Planning, UCL. She specialises in understanding governance for sustainability in a variety of geographical and institutional contexts. Her most recent book is *Theory for Planning Research* published by Palgrave in 2021. She co-edited *Regulation and Planning: practice, institutions, materiality* published



by Routledge, also in 2021, and *Actor Networks of Planning: Exploring the Influence of Actor Network Theory* published by Routledge in 2016. Her current research is looking at "Planning Without Growth"; a book under this title will be published by Policy Press in 2024. Yvonne hosts the Bartlett Planning Podcast and the podcast for the journal *Planning Theory*.
